'The Victims' pious and preachy

The title characters in The Vicinis, a Miami-based AIDS drama, ire a Cuban immigrant and his vife, lover and son. But the real ictims of this low-budget producion are viewers unfortunate hough to endure it.

The film isn't as garishly exloitative as its ad line — "If you
on't want to catch AIDS go see
'the Victims" — but it's a pretty
lismal affair, as depressingly plous
nd preachy as an issue-of-thereek TV movie. Even though the
roject's heart seems to be in the
light place, almost everything else
bout it is wrong.

The story purports to be about how AIDS shatters the life of Paul Genesco (Roger Pretto), an enterprising man who escapes Castro's Cuba in 1987 and rapidly establishes himself 2s a prosperous Miami businessman. The persistent Paul woos one of the first people he meets in America, an employment counselor named Elizabeth (Sherri D'Rosa), and eventually they marry and produce a son (Jonathan Flexman, in the movie's worst case of overacting).

Trouble comes to paradise in the form of Andrea (Mary Fanaro), a slinky architect recruited to design a project for Paul's real estate development firm. Ecstatic over the success of the project, they have an intense sexual encounter, during which Andrea transmits the AIDS virus to Paul, who then passes it on to Elizabeth.

Never mind that the incubation period for the syndrome is often many years long. Never mind that the word for catching a disease is "contracted," not "contacted." The movie is less concerned with the finer points of epidemiology than with cashing in on the fear that "one mistake, one damn mistake" can ruin an otherwise unblemished life.

For all the AIDS hoopla in its media campaign. The Victims doesn't even broach the subject until the movie is nearly two-thirds over. Until then, we have to settle for a trite rehash of the story of the noble, ambitious immigrant who makes it big in the United States. The film adds nothing fresh to this familiar tale, and by dwelling on it, shortchanges the real focus of the story.

I'm all in favor of regional film production, even though it's so often an embarrassment — remember Scooter in Palm Beach? — so it's a pleasure to report that The Victims boasts above-average production values (with the glaring exception of the costume designs, which tend toward the hideous). The cinematography, in particular, is surprisingly good, and the lead actors are competent.
